

Embedding enlargeable images in texts is standard operating procedure in the *Victorian Web*.

Here's how to do it:

1. for an image that will align with the **left** margin and when clicked upon with enlarge to full size:

```
<a href="xxx.html"></a>
```

2. For an image that will align with the **right** margin and when clicked upon with enlarge to full size:

```
<a href="xxx.html"></a>
```

3. for 2 images between paragraphs:

<a href="xxx.jpg">

```

4. for 3 images between paragraphs:

NOTE: when using examples 3 & 4,

- a. One has to see how the images look on the page. They should be just large enough to appear close to the margins and this will take some trial and error adjustments.
- b. If you only want clicking upon the thumbnail (the image that appears in the main document) to produce the larger image, use `<a href="xxx.jpg">`
- c. but if you want it to produce another text document, say, one that discusses the image, then use `<a href="xxx.html">`.
